### A Message From Rev. David Newton

One of the things I find hardest about living in the UK, even in the southern half, is the short days and long nights during the winter months. I find it harder to stay cheery, and long for the bright light of the sun to wake me up and to stay shining into the evening.

Getting up in the dark is perhaps the most difficult thing about it for me. I'm not exactly a morning person at the best of times, but when daylight is still an hour off and I have to drag myself out of bed I'm not fit for company. My poor wife knows it might take a while before I'm able to string sentences together in any coherent way!

In this country, and others at similar or more northerly latitudes, there have grown up a vast number of traditions that help us deal with the darker months: Halloween, Fireworks, and Christmas Lights have all helped us through since November. Most of these have their roots in the Christian story, and virtually all have the symbol of light at their centre. The most popular church services through this time are often candle lit - beautiful warm flickering flames causing the darkness to flee.

Light is a hugely powerful and emotive symbol. Light helps us see what's around us, it lights the way ahead, it takes away fear, it helps things grow. Darkness, on the other hand, is associated with fear and with evil. Such associations were used with great effect by the Gospel writer John. He called Jesus 'the light who shines in the darkness'.

As the darkness begins to recede let us take heart. For even if it does not feel like there is much light around either personally or politically, we can trust light is coming. As St John so powerful put it, 'the darkness has not overcome.'



### Long Road Comberton in the 1930s and 1940s

### Memories of an Octogenarian.

I came to live in Long Road on December 16th 1935 when I was 5 years old. My father had lost his right arm and had his right foot badly injured at Thiepval in the First World War. He bought three acres of land in Long Road stretching back to what is now Fox's Way and had a bungalow built by the local builder, Mr. A. G. Warboys of West Street. The land cost £48 and the bungalow £350. The builder also built a chicken house with perches over droppings boards and nest boxes for the hens to lay their eggs. All this for a cost of £15.

My parents planted an assortment of fruit trees on the land. There was no mains water or electricity laid on in Long Road. We had a well in the garden with a pump but this was not fit to use as drinking water. Our water for making tea was captured from the roof into a 150 gallon corrugated iron tank at the corner of the bungalow.

When I look at the roof now and see bird droppings spattered all over it I wonder what we must have consumed in our tea, but we survived!

We had to collect drinking water from a pump outside the council houses in Barton Road, quite a distance with heavy pails! Our lighting was candles and paraffin lamps and cooking was on a range and the way things cooked was affected by the direction of the wind causing how the coal burned. Cleaning of the range was by blackleading.

There was no mains sewerage so we had an outside bucket privy which my father had to empty regularly into a hole which he dug in the garden (we had some good vegetables!). We had no bathroom so we had to bring in a tin bath into what we called the wash house.

The water from buckets was heated in a brick built copper in the corner and as we sat in the bath we would open the fire door of the copper and put on more wood. The copper was kept filled up so that the whole family would be able to add more hot water. Everyone used the same water, cleanest first and the water would be bailed out the next morning.

### Long Road Comberton in the 1930s and 1940s Cont.

As you can imagine wash day was a mammoth task, sheets in the copper and smaller items washed in a tin bath stood on a fruit box all to go through a mangle before hanging on the line to dry. There were no rubbish collections so we had to dig a big hole in the garden and fill it with our rubbish. Water was finally laid on in 1947 and mains electricity connected and switched on on the 19th February 1954

Coming from Barton Road our bungalow was the 4th property. On the corner of Barton Road and Long Road there was a paddock on which John Beldam kept his horse and flat truck on which he used to deliver fruit and vegetables round the village. He had an orchard where the first two houses now stand.

The next house up the road was Mr. Arthur Papworthís. In his front garden he had a railway carriage which I think was brought from Lords Bridge station pulled by a team of horses. He used it for storing coal and fruit. In his porch he had his steel helmet which he had brought back home from the 14-18 war which, as a child, fascinated me. Next to Mr Papworth was an orchard belonging to Mr. Russell Baker.

Next up the road was a bungalow belonging to a family named Nightingale. My brother and I used to play with the children who lived there and on one occasion Mrs Nightingale took me to school on her bicycle carrier, the school being the one that is now the Nursery school. Onward up the road, the next property which was owned by my fatheris brother Harold Poole. This consisted of a wooden bungalow which I think was an ex army hut. He had various sheds and pig sties surrounding a cattle yard. He had a lorry with which he used to pick up churns of milk from the surrounding farms and take them to Cambridge for bottling.

At nights while the London blitz was going on we could see from our front garden, beyond the range of hills to the south, the glow from the fires in London and now and then an extra large glow when something very inflammable went up. The air raid sirens used to go most nights, but we saw very little of the action. The nearest bombs we had were in fields beyond the railway bridge on the road going past the vicarage - they must have been meant for the big ammunition store at Lords Bridge.

### Long Road Comberton in the 1930s and 1940s cont.

We kept pigs which we bought when they were weaned at about eight weeks old and kept them until they were ready for slaughter when another of my father's brothers, Lewis Poole, would take them in his old truck which had tyres which were devoid of tread and even had layers of the cords below showing, either to market or direct for slaughter. Some went to our local butcher, Mr. Woodley.

During the war and while food was still rationed smallholders and farmers were allowed to have a pig killed and keep half of it, the other half to go to the local butcher so we would get our half. The hams and shoulders and side had to be salted, then smoked at a bacon factory. These were then hung in our pantry and cut as required. Joints of pork were stored in brine in large earthenware pots. There were no fridges or freezers the only other store we had was a wooden meat safe with a thin gauge metal grille on the front which was hung outside on the wall. In hot weather milk had to be boiled in order to keep it overnight.

Living here in the country we were able to live much better than lots of people during rationing. We kept chickens and grew fruit in our orchard. We would kill a chicken for the table and every weekend my father would kill a chicken for a family from Cambridge who came to live in Comberton for the duration of the war.

I used to take it to them and as well as paying for the chicken they would give me two pence which I would take to the shop and buy a packet of fruit gums!

There was no doctors surgery in Comberton and like many people we did not have a car so we had to get someone to drive us to either Caxton, or later, to Dr Harry Richards in Grange Road, Cambridge. We did not have a telephone so if we needed to call we had to go to a call box down the village or next door to our uncle Harold.

### Parish Council Report from the Clerk

The Parish Council met on 10 January 2018.

## New Parish Council member and remaining vacancy

The Parish Council was pleased to welcome Dr Pamela Black of West Street as a new co-opted member of the Parish Council. While there remains one vacancy on the Council it is unlikely now that this will be filled as there will be elections in May. Information on the elections will be available on the District Council's website in the New Year.

# Greater Cambridge Partnership Cambourne to Cambridge Consultation

The Parish Council considered the options for a Park and Ride site and three possible route options for a new bus route between a new Park and Ride site and Cambridge. It was agreed to support the Scotland Farm site for the Park and Ride as being in the best position to receive traffic and for environmental reasons as it is felt that there would be a lot of light pollution and traffic problems if the Park and Ride site is built near Madingley Mulch. The Parish Council supported the proposed Route B and felt that a dedicated bus lane along Madingley Road would improve the speed of the journey.

#### Tree Work

The Parish Council has accepted quotations for the medium and longer term tree work recommended in the tree survey. Work around the village will commence shortly and is expected that the B priority work will be completed before the end of March 2018 and the C priority work will be completed within the next year.

## Budget 1st April 2018 to 31 March 2019

The Parish Council has approved its budget, which will be available on the website in due course. The Precept has been set at £59,400 which is the same as at present. In its budget the Council has included £2,000 towards a storage container on the recreation ground and £3,500 towards youth work in the village and approximately £5,000 towards a Transport Working Group project; details of which will be considered later in the year.

### Parking in Green End

Following concerns expressed by residents about hazardous and inconsiderate parking in Green End near the Doctors' surgery, the Parish Council will be arranging a meeting with the Practice

The landscape of the District Council will be changing after the elections in May with our village being served by 3 District Councillors rather than just me. These 3 people will also represent Coton, Barton, Grantchester, Harlton, Haslingfield, Harston and Hauxton so in theory we may not have a Comberton resident to represent us, even though I still intend to stand. The District Council in simplified terms looks after Bin collection, Council Houses, Planning, Licensing and collects our taxes, most other things are Parish or the County Council issues.

I was very saddened by the fire at the thatched cottage in West Street before Christmas. Thankfully it would appear to be salvageable. Cottages like this and similar give many of us a feelgood factor in the 100 mile an hour world we now live in.

## SCDC and more general issues raised by residents:-

Time taken to process planning applications - Officers are on the case and times will improve.

Queries relating to the 90 homes in front of Bennell Farm - ongoing!

Illegal hare coursing and organised crime - this has been witnessed alongside Long Road. If you witness it please phone the Police

House and vehicle crime - a similar theme and sadly increasing, so please be extra vigilant.

Parking Dr's Surgery - this is never ideal but was made much worse by a blocked drain resulting in the car park being closed. Normal service has now been returned

Parking on West Street - I agree with residents that this is an accident waiting to happen.

Money wasted on cycleways - this is a tricky one and I can see both sides of the argument. A consultation is imminent on this but will not help us through the centre of the village. Regarding the GCP consultation I firmly believe cycleways should be alongside the existing roads and not turning our footpaths into 3m tarmac roads.

Better bus service - this just gets worse and really links to the above point regarding funding.

We would like to sincerely thank our neighbours on West Street, our families, friends (old and new), and many others both living in Comberton and further afield, for their kindness and their practical help which have supported, helped, and sustained us since our thatched cottage was damaged by fire on Saturday 25th November 2017. I am also writing to share a few details about the fire and the next steps, taken with others, towards the reconstruction of West View, 39 West Street, our home, a Grade II listed thatched cottage, which was built in the early 1600s.

On the day of the fire, many villagers supported the firefighters, those evacuated from their homes, and others inside the police cordoned-off area of West Street. One neighbour made 150 cups of tea and coffee! Bottles of water and sandwiches were provided. and cakes and biscuits served. with one neighbour bringing out fresh flapjack. The firefighters told us that they really appreciated the exceptional support of the village that day, and later wrote to thank those whose names and contact details they had managed to record.

Four hours into the fire, a firefighter rescued our 16-year-old cat Lara, handing her to me soaking wet. A close neighbour, who knows Lara well, immediately took Lara into her warm home, where she is still being well cared for until we are settled in our 'new' rental home. Our dog Darcey, was kindly taken into another nearby neighbour's home, where she was well cared for by her daughter and befriended by their own dog.

On Sunday 26th November, the fire investigator analysed the cottage's remains and with the help of witness accounts has concluded that the fire was "an accident, an unfortunate combination of events. A thatch fire, which as often occurs, started within 20 minutes of lighting a fire in a wood-burning stove. A burning ember rose up through the lined and insulated chimney, by chance landing on a patch of fire-susceptible thatch". In this case, the burning ember landed on the old thatch at the back of the cottage, and in spite of all the preventative measures in place, a chance combination of events led to an eight-hour thatch fire on Saturday 25th November. This conclusion is supported by the forensics team, which also inspected the remains.

Once started, most thatch fires are not extinguished on the roof. They can only be controlled - by the many expert firefighters such as the ones that were with us on that day - until the thatch has burnt away and all the thatch has been raked from the cottage's roof. According to the firefighters this thatch fire had taken significantly less time to put out than most one said approximately half the time - and as a consequence more of the cottage was saved than is usually the case. This was because the cottage was in the final stages of re-thatching; a platform of scaffolding around it provided good access to the roof, and there was no attached wire over the thatch to hamper raking off the burning thatch.

For the last 18 years, we have enjoyed living in and looking after the cottage on West Street, with our children, their two cats and our friendly border terrier. We are fortunate to have met members of all the families who have lived in West View since the early 1900s. and to have learnt much about the history of the cottage and the surrounding land from the Jones family who live opposite. So we were delighted when, after a visit in December, Historic England and South Cambridgeshire District Council recommended that the 40

cottage should be reconstructed.

Since the fire much has happened, and here it is important to sincerely thank those who have advised, guided, and worked on progressing the protection of the cottage's remaining historic fabric and the clearance of the debris from inside and around the cottage, all in preparation for the reconstruction. A local farmer offered his help and quickly arranged for one of his workers to clear the burnt and sodden thatch from the garden, and managed to salvage our daughter's teddy bear. A local craftsman quickly made good the doors and locks, then removed radiators and pipework to expose the inner walls' fabric. so as to aid any strip out and drying.

Numerous professionals have come to our aid. Consulting civil and structural engineers Gawn Associates are our project lead; their expertise and understanding of the structure, reconstruction and associated regulation needs of historic buildings is progressing the work, leading us and others through the maze of requirements and processes. Builders and decorators Offord and Camp are providing advice, guiding us and others through material and practical requirements.

### From the Fire to the Tin Hat Wrapper Cont.

The Butler Brothers have cleared debris from around and inside the cottage, finding our son's teddy bear, and they continue with their work as further needs are identified. They have put in Acrow Props on the ground floor to make safe the upper floor, and re-laid the drive in preparation for the building work to follow. Scope Asbestos Analysis Services have inspected and tested for traces of asbestos bound into compounds used in the property's construction. DSS Electrical completed work on the cottage's electricity supply.

We have also benefited from Marlow Scaffolding Services whose scaffolding acted as a strong platform that enabled the firefighters to work more effectively and efficiently on the thatch fire; this platform has also facilitated subsequent inspections of the property. In addition, BWS Scaffolding erected the Tin Hat by 23rd December, wrapping the house up for Christmas (not to be unwrapped till later in 2018). This Tin Hat protects the cottage from further weather damage and enables work to continue inside. This protective structure continues to be maintained by BWS, with the platform enabling further inspection visits and the viewing of the property by contractors

such as the thatchers, who are putting together quotes for the 'new' thatch. We have reached the stage where a local surveyor has completed a measured survey and a local architect has drafted plans for the internal layout of the property. Last but not least, our insurers and Crawfords' Loss Adjustor are working with us to ensure that everything progresses in an efficient and timely manner.

We again extend our thanks to all those who have supported us in so many different ways both on the day of the fire and since. We are planning to write a book about the cottage, its history, the fire and reconstruction. ### On-call Firefighters

We are a vital part of today's fire and rescue service, providing an efficient, effective service that gives emergency cover to more than 90% of the UK. In Cambridgeshire they make up 56% of the workforce. An on-call firefighter is not based at a fire station but carries a pager and responds to emergency incidents as and when they happen. They receive an annual wage to reflect the time they commit to being available, plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights (one evening a week for two hours).

On-call firefighters often have jobs and are able to provide evening, daytime, or weekend cover. When on-call they may be at home, working for themselves or for a nearby company, or out in their local community within a 5 minute radius of the station itself. Our oncall firefighters are mainly located in rural communities, small towns and villages, and we will be able to tell you if you are within range to apply.
