From Rev David Newton - Selah

One of the (few) downsides that I experience in working from home is that there is no "switch off" or processing time between work and home life. If I haven't been out and about in the parishes, I'll walk out of my study-come-office, across the hallway, and into the kitchen to join in the hectic whirlwind that is children's dinner time. No hiatus, no in-between moment.

I was talking to a friend the other day who has quite recently begun working from home, having previously worked in the City, and he similarly commented on how he (almost) missed his time on the train - to read, or listen to a podcast, or pray, or just sit and be.

Moments to stop are crucial for being human - I guess that's what sleep is about in essence. But it seems me that we need other moments in the day, and week, month and year that are about pressing pause; allowing time to process, to take in what has been going on, and to be present in the moment.

As I understand it, the whole Mindfulness movement has picked up on the desperate lack of this in contemporary society. Of course such a need is not new, and societies throughout time have made ways to create this pause. In the Psalms there is a beautiful little word 'Selah'. It's a musical term, and no one is quite sure what it means, but the best contender is that it means 'pause'. Presumably the idea was that the singer would take a breath after these words or this phrase - to let them soak in and take effect.

As a church, we wanted to offer a pause from the noise of life, and so are beginning a new venture called 'Selah' this January. Through a series of gentle flowing postures and Christian inspired meditation we want to offer one way of helping us all take that moment of pause.

Sessions are free, held (usually) on the 4th Saturday of the month at 9am in the Village Hall and will last 1 hour. Starting 26th Jan. Sessions are free and will be run by a REPs Level 3 qualified exercise professional.

And even if that doesn't sound like your cup of tea. My hope is that each one of us finds moments of 'Selah' in a frantic world.

History of the Old Village Hall

Here we pick up the second part of this two part series. After detailing the origins of the buildings, the land and the committee, Brian continues;

Presumably the Institute prospered although information is thin on the ground. During the Second World War teas for the old folk were held at which traditional music was played for their entertainment. But in the 1950s with the advent of television there was a loss in interest in the Institute as a community centre. Table tennis was the last activity to use the Institute as originally intended.

The Trustees found it increasingly difficult to make ends meet and by 1961 the billiard table was removed and the Billiard Room was let out to Mr Storey: in fact the room was referred to by the Trustees as Storey's Factory. Eventually Mr Storey vacated the factory because of a shortage of labour in the village and the "Billiard and Storage Rooms" were let to Clive Sinclair of Sinclair Radionics Ltd in 1964 for 3 years.

In 1966 the property and lease belonging to the Institute were transferred into a new charitable trust, the Comberton Village Institute Trust. From this date the Institute documents are better preserved and they describe how the Institute building became increasingly exploited for business use.

In 1970 Grinding and Polishing specialists UGC Ltd took over the space vacated by Sinclair and increased their space to take over part of the west end of the original hospital hut when in 1975 the Institute had access to an adjacent building, the disused former school annex purchased by the Parish Council in 1973. In 1981 the woodworking company of David Lyons took over the space vacated by UGC.

The mid-1980's marked a watershed for the Institute. By 1985 the Trustees believed that the function hall was no longer safe for use by large numbers of people and the Trustees moved to let a larger proportion of the hall for commercial purposes to cover increasing maintenance costs, and to take out a lease on the former school annex.

In 1989 the Institute signed a lease to formally adopt the annex as the New Village Hall. It is ironic that this building no longer exists as it was demolished to make way for the car park of the present

village hall in 2006 while the original Institute survives as the Old Village Hall and Commercial Centre.

In 1985 the site upon which the Institute was built was sold by the Ancient Shepherds to Comberton Parish Council. The building, which was to be the "sole and absolute property of the Institute," was included in that sale to the surprise of at least one Trustee. At the stroke of a stranger's pen, the Trustees became tenants of the building they had bought and erected and had maintained and developed over decades.

In 1986 the firm of Chartered Accountants, Jefferys and Co, leased from the Trustees the space vacated by Lyons. The premises were named "The Commercial Centre" and were enlarged in 1993, taking in more of the Old Village Hall. In 1998/9 the kitchen area was converted into office space and a new kitchen area was constructed in the former hall cloakroom.

Solicitors took over part of the office accommodation, initially as sub-tenants in 1996 and then as tenants of the Trustees in 2000. By then the layout and organisation of the building had taken their present shape. The whole building was reroofed in 1993 and the interior has been gradually upgraded by tenants and Trustees to provide modern comfortable office accommodation in the Commercial Centre, with what remains of the Old Village Hall, occupying just under 50% of the original hospital hut, hired to Comberton Players, a local dramatic society.

Thus, although no longer suitable for its original purpose, the former Institute building still serves the community providing office space, a base for the local dramatic society, and a commercial income.

This income results from the determination of past Trustees to maintain a community facility for the whole village and for it to pay its way. In the past it has paid for the refurbishment of the now demolished school annex and contributed towards the cost of building the present village hall. Nowadays it contributes towards the running costs, maintenance and future requirements of the present hall as well as the Commercial Centre, for both of which the Trustees are 100% responsible.

Comberton Remembers

On a bright Sunday morning with blue skies and autumn tinted trees visible through the clear windows of the Lady Chapel, we quietly gathered in St.Mary's Church

Our Service of Remembrance lacked the formality of uniform (this year it was for Toft to host) but every pew occupied by village folk gathered to remember those known to them and lost, and to remember those we never knew. In his sermon Philip Dean read out the letter from the Commanding Officer to Jane, mother of Frederick Butler, who, living in Manor Farm, Green End, was told the details of her son's gallant death.

I had the honour of reading the names of those from this village killed in the First World War: Clifford Baker Alfred Day William Humphreys Thomas Baker John Day Sidney Keep Frederick Baker Walter Day William Mallows Stanlev Custance Arthur Harper Sydney Williamson Bert Darran Victor Harper

And those from Comberton killed in the Second World War: Samuel Brown Thomas Hills Joseph Clarke Frank Huckle Robert Cornwall Drucilla Mallows Hugh Ellis William Ridgewell Kenneth Ellis Stanley Chapman

Their names are all recorded in St.Mary's.

This year our Wreaths of Poppies were placed with dignity on the steps of the Altar-by Chris for the Parish Council, by David for the Friends of St.Mary's, by Mary for St.Mary's Church and by Sue on behalf of the Royal British Legion

"We will remember them with sorrow but will Honour them with Pride"

Later that evening folk gathered for the lighting of our Beacon, the 2 minute silence, broken by the ringing of the Church Bells. What a joy to see young families learning to 'pull on the ropes' listening intently for each individual note echoing high in the Tower above.



Heidi Allen MP Newsletter

It really doesn't seem possible that we have reached November – where has this year gone!? Don't even tell me how many days there are until Christmas!!

I held a public meeting to discuss the state of play regarding Brexit recently. More than 150 constituents attended, making for a lively and passionate discussion. This type of engagement away from the Westminster bubble is invaluable for me as it helps to ensure I do my very best to represent you. If you were unable to attend, but interested in the debate, you can find video recordings on my website at heidisouthcambs.co.uk/brexit

Whatever your views on Brexit, it is important for me to know what you are thinking. As the negotiations with the EU reach their inevitable conclusion, I will let you know about any further meetings I plan to hold.

Over the last month, I have been working hard to ensure the future of the Whippet X3 Papworth bus service. The service was originally due to stop this month, but through a joint effort with the District Council and our Mayor, it was possible for funding to be put in place to keep the service running until the end of March. This will 'bridge the gap' until some proposed changes to bus services, due to be in place from April 2019 are finalised. I will continue to work to provide a long-term sustainable future for this service as it is a lifeline for Papworth.

I am pleased to report that the Health and Social Care Secretary, Matt Hancock accepted my invitation to visit South Cambridgeshire. He began his day with a trip to CMR Surgical Limited (pictured) who are based on Madingley Road. Their development of surgical robotics will transform how surgery is carried out in hospitals all over the world, its real ground breaking stuff.

Extra funding from Government to fight potholes

The government has announced extra funding which will benefit roads in Cambridgeshire.

The Department for Transport has revealed how the £420 million announced in the Budget will be spent and it means an extra £6.653 million will go towards helping fight the campaign on potholes in our county.

Next year (2019-20),

Cambridgeshire will get this money from the Local Highways and Integrated Transport Block funds, which will go towards repairing roads and investing in small safety, bus priority or walking and cycling schemes.

This extra money will be combined with our specialist machines, known as the 'dragon patcher', working across the county's roads to complete pothole repairs.

Cambridgeshire County Council's Chair of the Highways and Community Infrastructure Committee, Councillor Mathew Shuter said: "Following the announcement from government, we're delighted to be receiving an extra £6.6m to tackle repairs to our roads in Cambridgeshire. The Roads Minister has recognised we need extra money this winter to keep our roads in good condition.

"We have learnt from the previous winter and have already made changes to the way we repair the potholes so we're ready for this winter.

"Our roads are important to us and we are listening to people's frustrations by already spending £3m on pothole repairs alongside a programme to resurface roads.

"We have a number of ways to fix potholes, including three of our own dragon patchers that can repair up to 150 potholes a day."

In order to keep our roads maintained, people need to help us by coming forward and reporting them using our online tool.



Fire Safety Advice during the Christmas Period

Christmas is approaching! The time of year when we're enjoying a tipple with friends, cooking up festive feasts for the family and entertaining loved ones. With all the fun to be had it is easy to be distracted when cooking in the kitchen.

50 per cent of all fires in the home start in the kitchen and more than half of those are as a result of distraction whilst cooking.

We want to help ensure your festive cheer doesn't go up in smoke this Christmas by sharing our tips below for safe cooking over the festive season:

- Never leave cooking unattended

- Do not cook when tired or under the influence of alcohol, drugs or medication that makes you drowsy

- Regularly clean the grill pan and oven. Built up fat can easily catch fire

- Never leave anything cooking if you leave the house

- Do not leave anything flammable on or near the hob – tea towels, oven gloves and even washing baskets can catch fire - Take care when using microwaves. Fires can start when people put food in too long.

- Oven chips or temperature control deep fat fryers are safer than using a chip pan. If you do use a chip pan, do not fill it more than one third with fat and turn the heat down if the oil starts smoking

- Fire can break out in household appliances so you should regularly maintain dishwashers, washing machines and driers, never leave them on if you go out or go to bed and register your appliances online to ensure you are made aware of any faults or recalls

- Have a working smoke alarm on each floor of your home. If it keeps going off when you are cooking it is probably in the wrong location or you may have the wrong type of smoke alarm

- Never take the batteries out of your smoke alarm.

If you do have a fire in the house, get out, stay out and dial 999.


